In 1935 we convened a "Conference on the Status of Married hich was attended by a large number of women's organisations. The recommendations was that there should be joint ownership by band and wife of any property acquired after marriage, other than ritance, by either party. Since this time we have organised to deput a tions to Premiers and Attorney Generals, asking for the ntation of this resolution.

We were pleased to read in the Press some little time ago that torney General was drafting a Bill to provide that wives should be not to retain the savings made by them from housekeeping money. We suppose there is any section of the community which has more asibilities than the wife and mother, and it is a reflection on our ty that, up to the present time this large army of women should be ted to perform such responsible work without any remuneration.

We regret that it is proposed to amend the Bill to provide that should have the right to retain only half the savings accruing from ekeeping money, on the grounds that the 50-50 principle is "enshrined arriage" and should apply to housekeeping savings.

Now that the subject has been raised, we submit that the time apportune for consideration to be given to passing legislation so that savings accumulated after marriage (other than by inheritance) shoul shared on a 50-50 basis by the husband and wife, thus carrying the 50 principle to its logical conclusion. This equitable arrangement is eady incorporated in the laws of some European countries and some of States of the U.S.A. It is a reform that has been asked for, for 17 years, by women's organisations in this and many other countries.

The husband benefits by the self-denial and frugality of a wif rough whose co-operation he is enabled to save. In fact, it is possible for a husband to save without the co-operation of his wife. The operation of his wife without a wife bends her whole energies to promoting the success of shand in his career, and should therefore have a share in the fruits success. Another reason to commend this reform is that a 50-50 that in the joint savings of the husband and wife would add an additional interest, and no doubt act as a deterrent against separation or verce

We ask that the Bill to amend the Married Woman's Property Ac would include the application of the 50-50 principle to all property coursed other than by inheritance, after marriage. We ask for your operation in this matter, which is of vital importance to all women
