There are not many of these underground films available in Australia, (perhaps the Communist Film Group will help stimulate a further interest in Australians producing their own genre of underground movie: This selection is represented by such names as Walerian Borowczych, Benjamin Hayeen, Howard Kaplin and Joseph Kramer.
