

The enormous energy

The scale of the problems initially led to extreme scepticism over the immediate possibility of producing such a weapon.

In the last three years a number of quite new particle

beam weapons programmes have been authorised by the US government, and several are already quite far advanced. There is, for instance, the Chair Heritage programme, which is being built for aircraft carriers. It involves equipping the ships with such devices, by

Their own programme seems mainly devoted to ground based systems of enormous power designed to screen Russia from ballistic missiles - though here, they are apparently well advanced, having successfully tested charged-beam devices against simulated military targets as early as 1979.

CAN THE ALP be won to a socialist orientation? Chris Rose examines the NSW Socialisation Units of the 1930's, the most serious attempt to convert the Labor Party to a strategy of 'socialism in our time'.

IN 1930 the New South Wales ALP saw in 130 the New South Wales ALP saw the inception of a movement — the Socialisation Units — which, for a period controlled the Metropolitan Conference of the Party and for a day forced the adoption of a three-year Plan for the building of socialism in our time.

The background to the development of the Socialisation Units was the rise to power of Jack Lang. This estate agent from Auburn rose through local government to become MP for Granville, In the ALP overnments from 1920 to 1922, Lang served as a reasurer renowned for his conservative policies.

AGNES SMEDLEY grew up in a poor mining family in Missouri at the turn of century. Her socialism and feminism grew out of the experiences of her working class background. She taught herself to write and became an inspiring socialist journalist.

Here is an extract from a collection of her writings, Portraits of Chinese Women in Revolution.

The Communists organised the workers on the basis of a simple and straightforward program: consistent militancy, rank and file democracy, and above all building a movement independent of the union bureaucracy. And on this basis they were able to win victories when the rest of the union movement was still.

mpressive struggle for weeks in the teeth of hostility The MM was very critical of its own role in supporting this strike. After all, it had only issued

The whole concept of "full" Indexation is itself a fraud which

only benefits the bosses. For even if we are awarded the full CPI increases we only get the money months after the prices have gone up. And the CPI index understates the real level of inflation.

In any case just because a Labor government "advocated" full

Indexation doesn't mean we would actually get it. The Arbitration Commission could easily defy the

As for the other part of the deal-price controls, they just won't work. In a capitalist economy the bosses can always find some way to get around the controls and jack up prices. Last time round the Prices Justification Tribunal was a sick joke, awarding four price increases to BHP within the space of 18

The joint ALP/ACTU statement policy makes it clear that there is not even going to be a serious attempt to control prices. It guarantees that the price controls "will be designed to enable enterprises to earn reasonable profits".



'We know from Christian sources that there were a mass of documents circulating in the first two centures after the file of Jesus It is not until 180 that Iranezus, bishop of Lyon, starts to argue that there are four goopels, and only four, which deserve to be taken seriously.

These now form the ones in our bibles and are called the 'canonical' gospels. We can say with a fair degree of certainty that the canonical gospels, Mathew, Mark, Luke and John, were composed in the period between roughly 70 and 150 AD. They are not, therefore, in our bibles and are called

contemporary records of the events they claim to recount word for word, but are the word for word, but are the product of the early Christian church. We find some obvious errors if we look at the content of these works. Luke, for intance; claims that the home of Jesus was

Nazareth but that he was born in Bethlehem. He tells a nice little story their ancestors, for the purposes of a Roman census. But there is no record of the existence of the town of Nazareth before the third century.

And, still more damning.

And, still more damning, the vast and cosmopolitan Roman Empire did not require its subjects to return to the home of their ancestors for the purposes of census.

It is open to a Christian to It is open to a Christian to reply that this is true but that it tells us only that the gospels are unreliable as evidence, are much corrupted and contain minor errors. What matters is their substantial teachings, which could still be true despite the fallibility

of human transmitters.
Unfortunately, this line of argument is a disastrous one for Christianity. For even the most elementary study of the gospels reveals that there are two quite different bodies of doctrine present within them.
