

THE MEANIN OF MARXISM Duncan Halle

THE DEFEAT of the German revolution early in 1919 emphasised the need for an effective revolutionary international and a decisive break with unreliable 'independent' and 'centrist' leaders.

The Communist International held its founding conference in Moscow in March 1919. Within three years it had gained the support of mass Communist parties in Germany, France, Crechoslovakia and some smaller European countries, on the basis of an uncompromising internationalist and revolutionary programme.

Unfortunately by that time the crisis had passed, European capitalism had been temporarily stabilised and the Soviets outside Russia destroyed. But the next crisis would, it was hoped, find well-established

mass of the Russian people—the peasants. So long as there was a real danger that the Tsarist landowners might be restored, large sections of the peasantry supported the Bolsheviks. central India. In the brief few years of its existence, this union has won dramatic improvements in the sub-poverty line wages and harsh conditions.

JOHN ROSE visited the iron ore miners towards the end of last year. Here is his report.

## Rail safety by the board

An unemployment rate of 28%—highest in the world outside Germany Families living in caves, in disused water tanks, even on old rubbish tips. That was Australia in the Depression.

Against the tidal wave of sackings, evictions and degrading dole hand-outs, only one group of people fought back. . .

THE UNEMPLOYED WORKERS' MOVEMENT

THE COMMUNIST Party was absolutely determined to build an Unemployed Workers Movement against the misery of the Depression in Australia.

One can pick up any copy of its "Workers' Weekly", or "Red Leader" which the Communist-led Militant Minority Movement put out, and find numerous calls for organizing the unemployed.

Their greatest success was amongst relief workers. Relief jobs were given to unemployed men by state governments— dirty, unskilled jobs like road construction

and swamp reclamation.

Relief workers were difficult to organise. They were invariably out of money—if they lost their jobs, they faced immediate starvation.

immediate starvation.

The Unemployed Workers' Movement method of organizing was illustrated by one report in "Red Leader", from a UWM activist on a job at Centennial Park in Sydney.

He stills how at first he had no support. Then he found one person who was prepared to go on a delegation to the boss with him to complain about

After a while, the UWM member was able to put

out a job bulletin with this man, for which he collected sixpence, and he says disgustedly that most of the workers threw the bulletin away.

But eventually he had a weekly bulletin, he was collecting the full cost of it, and he had a working

job delegates' committee.

Occasionally there were disputes, usually confined to the job, and very brief because strikes were so difficult for retief workers. A typical example from "Red Leader" was about a road construction team at Ballmba in Britahne.

"As small the police came onto the job, but this didn't have the desired effect. The local engineer came, but the men demanded to see the City Britaneer.

There were some apectacular relief strikes, but these were very soolated occurrences. One was at a swamp reclamation site at West Concord in Sydney, where the gangers demanded that the men stay on the site during lunch and cat their meal in

This was unusual, since governments of the time were not too interested in the results of relief work.
Relief work was seen as charity—"giving the unemployed something to do"—and they didn't

In these conditions, there was a need to organise meticulously, and after a state conference in 1934, the UWM put out a manual concentrating largely on "How to organise strikes" amongst relief workers.
The UWM's best-known area of activity was the

eviction fights.

Most of the time, the Communist Party and the

UWM could do little to stop evictions. There were thousands of them, and all the UWM could do in most cases was to send their local secretary to court to try and get an extension or the rent lowered.

But the UWM activists were in many ways the shock troops in the fight legainst eviction.

The two most famous eviction fights were at Newtown and Bankstown in Sydney. The "Sydney Morning Herald" reported the one at Newtown, in which at least one UWM member died, in typical objective fashion:



March 1983 is the 100th anniversary of the death of Karl Marx. Alec Kahn looks at the life of the great revolutionary whose deas and political activity inspired the modern socialist movement.

KARL MARX was born in 1818 in the Prussian Rhineland town of Trier, the son of a well-to-do Jewish lawyer who had converted to Lutheranism.

The Rhineland had been occupied by France-until 1814, and its intellectual life was heavily influenced by the French Revolution, Marx's own family circle was no exception to this. wen family circle was no exception to this.

Their offensive was resisted by the rank and file of the trade unions, and the Depression was ushered in by three gigantic industrial struggles.

The Nationalist government of Stanley Bruce brought in eglislation to victimise striking wharfies and scabs were

The last of the three major struggles was on the northern NSW coaffields, where the owners locked out the miners in an attempt to impose a 12% wage cut.

When the federal election was called for October 1919, the Labor Party promised the miners that they would prosecute the owners for the lock-out and re-spen the mining.

sums of money from the miners. But when the Scullin
government was finally elected, it refused to honour its

The miners fought on for another year. They, too, faced armed police who bashed and batoned them when they marched. In December 1929, a young miner, Norman Brown, was killed by a police builter at Rothbury.




